NEW POLICY ON CANINE HYBRIDS

RESOLVED that the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) House of Delegates adopt the new policy on Canine Hybrids as noted in <u>Attachment 1</u>, which will supersede the current policy on Canine Hybrids (<u>Attachment 2</u>) and the policy on Vaccination of Wolf Hybrids – Position of the AVMA-PLIT (<u>Attachment 3</u>).

Statement about the Resolution

The Council on Public Health (COPH) reviewed the policies on Canine Hybrids and Vaccination of Wolf Hybrids – Position of the AVMA-PLIT. The intent of the new policy is:

- To incorporate the policy on Vaccination of Wolf Hybrids Position of the AVMA-PLIT to allow members and other stakeholders access to a single document that clearly conveys the AVMA's policy on canine hybrids;
- To define the term "canine hybrid";
- To emphasize that providing care for a canine hybrid may be considered an illegal act and that in jurisdictions that do permit canine hybrids, veterinarians may be required to verify legal ownership; and
- To eliminate language encouraging development of drugs and vaccines for use in canine hybrids.
